Clery Act

History of the Clery Act



Jeanne Ann Clery

Named in memory of 19-year-old Lehigh University freshman Jeanne Ann Clery who was raped and murdered in her residence hall room on April 5, 1986.

Her parents believe she would have been more cautious if she had known about other violent crimes at Lehigh.







History (continued)

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act (the "Clery Act") requires all colleges and universities that participate in federal financial aid programs to keep and disclose information about crime on and near their respective campuses.




History (continued)

- 1988-Became law in Pennsylvania
- 1990-Became a federal law: *Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act; a*mended the Higher Education Act (HEA) of 1965
- 1998-Renamed "Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act" (aka the "Clery Act")
- 2000 & 2008-Amended as part of the Higher Education Opportunity Act (HEOA)
- 2013-Amended as part of the Violence Against



Purpose





Federal Monitoring and Penalties



- Compliance monitored by the Department of Education
- Civil penalties \$67,500/violation
- Suspended Federal Student Financial Aid





Why am I considered a CSA

University Audit & Compliance, General Counsel, Human Resources, and the Office of Emergency Management work with Campus Safety and all Institutional departments and units to identify the appropriate employees by Clery definition.





What are Campus Security Authorities

Campus Security Authorities (or "CSAs") is a Clery-specific term that encompasses four groups of individuals and organizations associated with an institution who are responsible for reporting crimes under the Clery Act.



Who is a CSA?

- Individuals and organizations to which students should report criminal offenses.
- Utica University Officials with responsibility for student and campus activities.
- Campus Safety
- Title IX Coordinators





Examples of CSA's at Utica University

*Note: this is not an exhaustive list

- Provost and Staff
- Dean of Students and Staff
- Representatives of Student Housing, SLCE, SGA and Greek Life Advisors
- Student Judicial Programs or Other Discipline Officials (Conduct, DEI, BRRN, BIT, etc.)
- Directors or Managers of Student Service Centers (Success Coaches, Registrar, Admissions, etc.)



Examples of CSA's at Utica University

- Officials who oversee extracurricular activities
 - Intramurals, events, clubs activities, etc.
- Director of Athletics, Coaches, Assistants, Trainers, Staff
- Student Health Directors
- Faculty and Staff Advisors to Student Groups





Examples of persons who are CSAs under Clery

*Note: this is not an exhaustive list

- A dean of students who oversees student housing, a student center, or student extracurricular activities
- A director of athletics or a team coach/assistant/trainer
- A student resident advisor or assistant or a student who monitors access to dormitories
- An advisor to a student group



Examples of individuals who are <u>NOT</u> CSAs under Clery

Note: This is not an exhaustive list

- A faculty member who does not have any responsibility for student and campus activities beyond the classroom.
- Pastoral and Professional Counselors
- A licensed mental health counselor or a pastoral counselor (recognized by a religious organization to provide confidential counseling) **AND** working within the scope of their license or religious assignment.
- Clerical or cafeteria staff



Special Note to Counselors

 Even though as a counselor, under certain conditions, you do not have to report, you can tell the person how he/she can report the crime to Police.


Utica University encourages reports of crimes by counselors and victims.

- Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter
- Negligent Manslaughter
- Sex Offenses
 - Rape
 - Fondling
 - Incest
 - Statutory rape
- Robbery
- Aggravated assault

- Arson

Stalking







CSA's Must Report the following Clery Crimes:

Hate Crimes:

- Larceny-Theft
- Simple assault
- Intimidation
- Destruction, damage or vandalism of property



Bias categories:

- Race
- Gender
- Gender Identity
- Religion

- Ethnicity
- Disability
- Sexual Orientation
- National Origin





CSA's must also report...

Arrests and referrals for disciplinary actions:

- Carrying and possessing weapons
- Illegal drug abuse
- Liquor law violations

Drunkenness and DUI do not count as a Liquor Law violation



Do NOT report violations of university policy as a Clery crime

What to tell a person reporting this to me:

- Discuss resources available
- Disclose that you are a mandatory reporter under Clery
- Reassure them you will not identify anyone unless the victim consents

Student Bill of Rights

All individuals have the right to:

- . Make a report to the University, local law inforcement, and/or state police
- Have disclosures of domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, and sexual assault treated seriously
- Make a decision about whether or not to disclose a crime or violation and participate in the conduct process and or criminal justice process free from pressure by Utica University
- Participate in a process that is fair, impartial, an provides adequate notice and a meaningful opportunity to be heard
- 5. Be treated with dignity and receive from the University, courteous, fair, and respectful health care and counseling services, where available
- 6. Be free from any suggestion that the reporting individual is at fault when these crimes and violations are committed, or should have acted in a different manner to avoid such crimes or violations
- Describe the incident to as few University representatives as practicable and not be required to unnecessarily repeat a description of the inciden
- Be protected from retaliation by Utica University, any student, the accused and/or the respondent, and/or their friends, family, and acquaintances within the jurisdiction of Utica University

9. Access to at least one level of appeal of a

- 10. Be accompanied by an advisor of choice who may assist and advise a reporting individual, accused, or respondent throughout the conduct process including during all meetings and hearings related to such process
- 11. Exercise civil rights and practice of religion without interference by the investigative, criminal justice, or judicial or conduct process of Utica University

What information do I provide?

- Encourage them to seek medical help
- Sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence or stalking, CSA's are required by VAWA to provide:
 - Written resources for victims
 - Guidance on how to preserve evidence
 - A copy of "Resources" flyer

Utica University Title IX Resources



Sexual Assault/Misconduct

Any sexual activity done without affirmative consent or with an individual under the age of 17 in New York.

Affirmative Consent

Affirmative consent is a knowing, voluntary and mutual decision among all participants to engage in sexual activity. Consent cannot be given when incapacitated by substances (alcohol, drugs, etc.), when being coerced or pressured, or otherwise being forced from the individuals.

Intimate Partner Violence (IPV)

Use of physical violence, coercion, threats, intimidation, isolation, or other forms of violence directed towards a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with another. IPV can be a single act or a pattern of behavior in relationships.

Stalking

Stalking refers to a course of knowingly unwanted conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to fear for that person's safety or the safety of others, or suffer substantial emotional distress.

1. Get to a safe place.

- 2. Get help. Consider telling someone you trust what has happened.

Confidential vs. Private


Confidential resources CANNOT share information without explicit consent from the student.

Exception: someone is threatening to harm themselves or others.

Private resources need to share information, with or without consent from the student.

Clery does not require reporting if:

- Do not report crimes to Clery Coordinator IF:
 - A person tells you about a crime that occurred BEFORE they came to Utica University; OR
 - While they were away from campus and not involved in a Utica University sanctioned event or activity.





What NOT to do:

- Do NOT try to determine whether a crime took place or who was at fault.
- Do NOT try to apprehend the alleged perpetrator of the crime or action.
- Do NOT try to convince a victim to contact Law Enforcement if the victim chooses not to do so.
- Do NOT identify the victim unless the victim consents to being identified.





What is done with Clery Reports?

 The Clery Coordinator determines whether a crime is reportable under Clery and if so includes the deindentified crime as a statistic published each October in our annual Security and Fire Safety Report, available on the Campus Safety website and hard copy in the Campus Safety Office.


